## MINISTER'S MESSAGE

## He's Still the King of Kings

Based on Exodus 3:13-15, Revelation 1:4-8

Happy New Year! (Almost) Today is the last Sunday of the Christian calendar. Which means, today is rather like New Year's Eve, spiritually speaking. In a month or so, after the Christmas turkey has come and gone, and the sparking wine is chilling in the fridge for you to toast in 2019, you might find yourself sitting down and making a short list of goals for the coming year: losing a few pounds around the waist, joining a book club, taking a trip to visit an old friend.

But peeling back the frivolity of the season reveals some more serious questions that lurk in our minds as we consider the coming year: Do I need a change of scenery? Is it time to get more care for myself, or for the one I love? Is this my last winter in the condo or the house? Is this my last winter?

In matters of faith, we might ask ourselves similar questions. Are you and your Creator on friendly terms right now? Just because you are here in a pew does not necessarily mean that everything is OK in your head and in your heart with your Saviour. Are there things you need to sort out? Questions you need to ask? Anger you need to let go of? Tears that need to be shed? Is there room in your heart for something new God might be trying to show you?

Now is the time. Why?

- Because we are at the cusp of something old becoming something new.
- Because it's good to do a check and balance once in a while, not just on the car, but on yourself as well.
- Because we will conveniently get side tracked soon with the beautiful story of Bethlehem, and allow ourselves to push the difficult questions

aside and not deal with them.

■ Because your world may be completely upside down by tomorrow, and it would be good for you and God to be on friendly terms, so that you can face the challenge together.

Moses sat in the desert sand and tried to understand the meaning of the burning bush he had just witnessed. It had been sign. And although he shied away from the burden of responsibility that awaited him, he knew in his heart, what had to be done. It overwhelmed him. It frightened him. It paralyzed him in his tracks. Defy the Pharaoh? The king? Him? Lead thousands of willing and unwilling Israelites through miles of sand, defeat enemy armies, poisonous snakes, lack of food and clean water, extraordinary desert heat, and the minutia of problems that come with daily living? Him?

Too many decisions. Too many problems. Too much change.

"How do I possibly do this," Moses asked of his God. "What do I tell the people?" "Calm down," God said, as He soothed Moses' fear. "Listen carefully. 'I am.' Think about

that for a minute. 'I am.' I can make anything possible. I can change everything. I am the Almighty. And I am not going anywhere. You tell the people:

'I am has sent me to you...
The God of your fathers
The God of Abraham,
The God of Isaac and the God
of Jacob...
This is my name forever, the
name you shall call me
from generation to
generation.'" (v14-15
paraphrased)

Generations later, the power of those two words, "I am" surface again, in the Book of Revelations:

"I am the Alpha and the Omega," says the Lord God, "who is, and who was, and who is to come, the Almighty."

(v8)

Our God did not say, "I am with you at the beginning and the end." He said,

"I am the beginning.
I am the end."

That means, that before any of your beginnings, God was already there. And after all of your endings, God will remain. There is no promise greater than this.

- **Before** everything that is you, and about you, God was there, preparing the way.
- **During** your life: all the things you have done, mistakes you've made, successes you've had, victories won, and disappointments suffered, God was there, walking with you.
- Today, tomorrow, until your earthly life is complete, and beyond, God is there, keeping your memory alive.

Which means, you can face those New Year's resolutions. spiritual or otherwise, with your head up and a solid step forward. You can answer the difficult questions, make the hard decisions, change your scenery, add a little colour, and know that at each step along the way, you are 'safe in the arms of your Saviour.' It is in knowing that our Christ is still the king of kings and lord of lords, which allows us to be optimistic in a cynical world, hopeful in shadowy places of uncertainty, courageous to

swim against the current, or open to try something new.

There were a lot more bumps along the road of life for Moses. The ten plagues were just the beginning! It got much worse after that. To complicate it all, the Israelites continued to misbehave, and the map to the Promised Land was lost. It would take forty years to accomplish what scholars think could have been done in about two weeks of walking. Yet Moses did not waver, because he remembered God's words. "I am! And if 'I can' then you can too, because *I am* with vou."

You and I walk into a 'new year' this week with the Great "I Am." Let us follow Him, saying confidently, "I can."
